CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19) CATCH UP PREMIUM

In December 2021, the government announced an additional £1 billion for a recovery premium over the next two years (2022-23 and 2023-24). Building on this year's recovery premium, this will help schools to deliver evidence-based approaches to support the most disadvantaged pupils.

The Department for Education has allocated **£65,826** to help targeted students catch-up on missed learning after the lockdown periods, during which schools were closed for on-site learning.

In 2022 - 2023 these monies are being used to fund:

- Extra staffing to support students in Maths, English and Science classes.
- Individual reading sessions with staff for those students who have fallen behind in reading.
- Additional teaching in English and Maths, in small groups to improve reading for meaning, writing and numeracy.
- Reduced class sizes in English and Maths to address the needs of targeted students.
- After-school catch-up sessions in all years and in all subjects to support students who have fallen behind at the start of the academic year.
- 'My Tutor' online 1:1 and 3:1 provision for key groups in Years 10, 11, 12 and 13.
- The purchase of revision guides for Year 11 and Year 13 classes in key subject areas.

How will the effect of this expenditure on the educational attainment of identified students be assessed?

- All Year 7 students will be assessed (using CATs) on entry to the school and those students who need to 'catch-up' will be identified. In other years assessment takes place at the start of the autumn term to identify those students in need of catch-up support.
- Students are monitored over three formal periods of assessment in the academic year. There is one formal assessment per term. There are Raising Standards leads across all Key Stages.
- The assessments will identify those students who are not making appropriate progress. Additional support will be put in place to support these students with wave 1 and wave 2 interventions.
- The final assessment of summer 2023 will show that the vast majority of students have caught up. However, the assessment cycle will identify any students who have failed to catch-up and if needed additional support will be given in the autumn term of 2023.
